eaching the techniques for small scale jade carving will be my mission this summer at Camp Brotherhood. What a great way to celebrate the 25th annual symposium!

The workshops held there in the late 90s were very popular and I expect there will be a lot of interest again. Working small scale for those sculptors who normally focus on monumental works can be a bit like cleansing the palate! What better in the middle of a long project, than to create a lovely bangle or pendant in translucent jades of many hues. Wyoming olives, Canadian chromite laden beauties from Kutcho and Cassiar B.C. will be offered for sale with my recommendations for selecting the perfect piece of jade for the ideas you have for jewelry or small carvings.

We are all accustomed to tool making. I will be pleased to share with the group the way to convert a drill press into a "point carver." This has proven to be the most versatile piece of equipment for jade artists that focus on small and medium sized pieces. I hope to have 2 of them there for the workshop.

A larger jade carving of my own will be brought to the workshop to demonstrate the carving process, and tooling involved.

I will be pleased to have this opportunity to encourage those interested to pursue the art of carving jade. The renaissance is still in the making! For example,

just love to carve. The business of sculpture and making a living is a different story. While merging these activities, I try to be a good mother, good neighbor and friend while attempting to move forward creatively - wondering just when all that polishing will get done!

I speak and live Italian (& English) in my double life between Italy and my modest home studio on the Oregon coast. I carve marble: Italian marble, travertine and marble that is imported from all over the world to Carrara, Italy, where I rough it out before shipment back to Oregon. My goal is to carve sculpture and send it back out into the world. Last year I installed a sculpture in Queensland, Australia and

finally had a show of finished works in Italy.

I recently received a career opportunity grant from the Oregon Arts Commission and The Ford Family Foundation which helped to publish a catalog of recent figurative sculpture. Awarded the Jordan Schnitzer Printmaking Fellowship this past fall, I worked with a master printmaker to create a series of soft ground prints.

I am presently carving a couple of abstract cloud sails in bardiglio marble as well as trying to figure out how to finish these new tornado inspired sculptures.

I fell in love with a green onyx last year that resulted in vessel forms which seem to me like petrified water, petrified rain, petrified tears.

I love to share and to teach as I try to encourage that which makes the work of each sculptor unique to his or her essence.

I am really looking forward to being with all of you at Camp B this summer. Carve your truth. Presto! See you soon!

Good news is that I'm all for light-hearted instruction—so we'll have a little fun and who knows what we might hammer out together. See you there!

GEORGE PRATT

his is George Pratt, a dusty senior citizen sculptor in stone from Vancouver, Canada—an old face around the NWSSA (charter member) and still excited about another symposium in July.

Over a busy career beginning in 1970, I've carved most stones that sculptors will encounter. I'm not your world's great sculptor (although I get it right now and again) but along the way I acquired a lot of experience carving and I'm still discovering the best tools and methods to make it happen. I take pleasure in showing others how it's done and folks around the NWSSA say I have a knack for it. Speaking of discovering, the main pleasure for me has been discovering an aspiring new sculptor at every symposium, who has talent beyond what I could ever hope for. Who will it be this year?

OUND ON ACEBOOK:

INTRODUCING FLORENCE JARRIGE

Inherited my passion for stone from my parents, passionate geologists who spent three decades overseeing a cavern in the area where I grew up. In addition to a hands-on education on mineral formations from our life running the cavern and giving guided tours, my parents and I visited stone quarries all around Burgundy. The desire to transform stone came to me from a very early age. The path of my life eventually brought me to Austin, Texas, where I took instruction in stone sculpture at the museum of sculptor Elizabeth Ney. I then worked at Archaic, where I worked on many stone projects both public and private. Most notably, while working with Archaic we created a series of sculptures for Austin municipal buildings including Palmer Auditorium.

I returned to France in 2002 to continue my education in stone. After receiving my certification in stone carving and ornamentation I worked in Brittany on the prestigious Briton monuments of Plougastel and Guimillau.

I then made the acquaintance of the Compagnons du Devoir, who allowed me to work with them on historic monuments. I was able to participate in work on prestigious cathedral and chateau sites such as the Cathédrale d'Orléans, the Cathédrale de Limoges, the Grand Palais de Paris, the Abbey of Cluny, and the Chateau des Ducs de Bretagne in Nantes.

Presently I continue my work as a sculptor on historical monuments and also create privately commissioned works, in perpetual pursuit of the perfect curve and contour, and fueled by the passion for bringing stone to life.

My approach is anchored solidly in the tradition laid down by the sculptors of my country. Exploring the rich heritage they have bequeathed us, I find new inspiration and, without copying directly I allow my imagination to combine forms and find its own expression, to create plausible beings which sculpture can bring to life. In this way the myths which populate the history of my country can relive and persist.

I work in a state of emotional intensity which allows me to feel connected to humanity and also defy any sort of boundaries or distractions, physical or otherwise.



TRIVIA ANSWER:

Vitruvian Man was drawn by Leonardo da Vinci (1452 AD to 1519 AD). Leonardo placed the double, male figure in a circle and a square as a guide for proportional representation. The much older, original concept came from a passage about geometry and human proportions in the writings of the Roman architect and engineer Vitruvius (75 BC to 15 BC).






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
